CAMPAIGN AGAINST CENSORSHIP

NATIONAL COUNCIL

Minutes of the meeting held at 7.00, Friday, 2nd February, 2001, at Conway Hall, Red Lion Square, London WC1.

Present: Ted Goodman (Chair), Kent Boulton, Chris Hardman, Nigel Meek, Morris Riley, Basil Stein, Mark Taha, Mary Hayward, Dave Bird (after 7.30).

- 1. Apologies for absence were received from Steve King.
- 2. The Minutes of the meetings held on 16th June and 3rd November 2000 were signed as correct.
- 3. Matters arising from the minutes the Home Office had written to acknowledge receipt of the Campaign's response to the consultation paper on R18 videos.

There were no other matters arising.

- 4. Balances: HSBC £413.74p, Girobank £133.26p
- 5. The draft of the Campaign's comments on the white paper: 'A New Future for Communications' (CM5010) was discussed and expanded to include areas where comment had been specifically asked for. Mrs.Hayward to prepare and send the final version.
- 6. The draft of the Campaign's comments on the Home Office discussion paper: 'Setting the Boundaries: Reforming the law on sex offences' was discussed and amended. Mr.Hardman's suggestions for references to case law were adopted.Mr.Goodman to prepare and send the final version.
- 7. Advertising of sex services Mr.Goodman wrote to the Home Office about proposals for a new law specifically criminalising cards in telephone boxes. He received a form letter which did not answer CAC's points and had written again no reply.
- 8. Proposed proscription of 'Adult X' satellite channel Mr.Goodman had written to the Department of Culture to oppose the ITC's request no reply.
- 9. Other Business
- i. Dave Bird distributed a report on various topics. Unfortunately he did not give enough detail to enable them to be followed up.
- ii. A man who sold blue videos in Grimsby and York was fined £5,800 by York Magistrates Court after purchasers complained to Trading Standards that the tapes sold as "hardcore" were soft porn. He admitted the offences.
- iii. The Advertising Standards Authority banned an advert for the Yves St.Laurent perfume 'Opium' which showed a not-quite-naked woman lying on her back. Mr.Goodman had written a letter of protest no reply.

- iv. Mr.Goodman had attended a Sexual Freedom Coalition meeting at which 3 members of the BBFC spoke. Council members who would like a copy of his report please contact him or Mrs.Hayward.
- v. Pasolini's 'Salo' (first released in 1976 but shown only in cinema clubs) had been given an 18 certificate for both cinema and video and Channel 4 wanted to buy it for FilmFour.
- vi. BBC Films, which provided some of the money, had asked Universal, the distributor, to remove 35 f-words from 'Billy Elliot', to produce a version to be marketed at half-term. The unbowdlerised version has a '15' certificate. The producers insist that the language is an essential part of the film and not noticable in context. Tewkesbury town council had voted to reduce the rating to '12'.
- vii. Mrs.Hayward to attend the Liberty AGM (16th/17th June) as CAC's delegate.
